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ABC Checks on 17 Businesses in San Luis Obispo County, Three Sell Alcohol to Minors

South San Luis Obispo County - Investigators of the California Alcoholic Beverage Control (ABC) have cited three individuals for selling alcohol to a minor during an April 28, 2008 enforcement operation. The actions were the result of a compliance check operation in which minors under the direct supervision of the investigators, attempted to purchase alcohol from 17 retail licensees in the incorporated and unincorporated areas of South San Luis Obispo County.

Those who sold to the minor face a minimum fine of \$250, and/or 24 to 32 hours of community service for a first violation. In addition, ABC will take administrative action against the business's liquor license. That may include a fine, a suspension of the liquor license, or the permanent revocation of the license.

ABC is conducting the compliance checks state-wide to reduce the availability of alcohol to minors. The enforcement is part of Operation Save a Teen, a national effort launched by the National Liquor Law Enforcement Association (NLLEA) during the month of May. Underage drinking in the United States is reaching a critical level. Statistics show that in 2005, about 10.8 million persons aged 12-20 (28% of the age group) reported drinking alcohol in the past month. Nearly 7.2 million (18.8%) were binge drinkers, and 2.3 million (6%) were heavy drinkers. In the month of May, NLLEA officers will focus on underage drinking enforcement with a goal to save one teen at a time, one incident at a time and one day or night at a time. ¹

222 persons under the age of 21 died in alcohol-related crashes in California during 2006. ABC Director Steve Hardy says ABC investigators will be working throughout California to enforce the law and hopefully prevent alcohol-related tragedies. "May is a month when families should be celebrating landmark events such as high school and college graduations and a wide variety of outdoor community events," Hardy said. "Everyone needs to work together to keep those events from being marred by alcohol-related tragedies."
